Unlicensed and Unregulated Cannabis Retailers (Dispensaries)

The Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Chief & Council are issuing this community bulletin regarding the unlicensed and unregulated Cannabis Retailers and Dispensaries in operation and those considering future operations.

On October 17, 2018 the Cannabis Act came into effect. The Cannabis Retailers and Dispensaries currently operating on reserves fall within the jurisdictional boundaries and regulations of those respective First Nations. At this time there is currently no legal framework for cannabis production and/or sales, these activities remain illegal and licensing requests will not be brought forward to Council until the framework is established.

On August 29, 2018 Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Chief & Council passed a motion prohibiting activities related to the production and/or sales of cannabis.

The following motion was issued by the Council on August 29, 2018:

MOTION NO. 05 SUBJECT: UNLICENSED CANNABIS DISPENSARIES

"That the Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Council hereby directs that there will be no unlicensed cannabis dispensaries within the Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit territory (Moraviantown) until there are proper Tribal law and regulations in place.

Failure to comply will result in legal action.

This law and regulations will be in place prior to the legalization of recreational cannabis."

This means that effective August 29, 2018 all cannabis dispensaries are subject to enforcement of warrants, seizures and charges by the Local Enforcement Services working in coordination with the Eelünaapéewi Lahkéewiit Police Department.

There are serious public health and safety concerns along with unknown traffic trespassing onto our territory associated with cannabis use that must be addressed before we can even consider allowing the production and/or sales of cannabis to take place.

The results from the Community Referendum held June 1, 2019 positively supported both Licensed Recreational and/or Medicinal Cannabis facilities within the Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit territory. A specific Task Force that will oversee the research on and not limited to the following:

- Business Commission
- Business Policies, Permits. Regulations, Licensing
- Health / Safety / Quality Standards

SNOW REMOVAL POLICY

SNOW REMOVAL POLICY Approved November 24, 2017

Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit (Delaware Nation) Council

SNOW REMOVAL POLICY

During snow and ice conditions, many people call requesting for snow removal. The following is the Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Council's policy on snow removal.

1. INTRODUCTION

In the best interest of the Members, the Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Council assumes the basic responsibility for control of snow and ice on its roads. Reasonable ice and snow control is necessary for routine travel and emergency services. The Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Council and its Administration, through its Public Works Department, will provide such control in a safe and cost effective manner, keeping in mind safety, budget, personnel and environmental concerns. The Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Administration will use Public Works departmental employee(s) and/or equipment to provide this service.

2. WHEN WILL THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT START THE SNOW REMOVAL OPERATIONS?

As snow and icy conditions vary by the day of the week and the hour of the day, the Public Works Superintendent will identify the appropriate resources and equipment to deal with the winter weather situations.

Depending on how wide spread and intense the storms are, the Public Works Superintendent may need to continually adjust to achieve the most benefit of its available resources and equipment.

The Public Works Manager and Superintendent will decide when to begin snow removal operations. The criteria for that decision are:

- A. Snow accumulation of 2 inches or more;
- B. Drifting of snow that causes problems for travel; and
- C. Icy conditions which seriously affect travel.

Snow and ice control operations are expensive and involve the use of limited personnel and equipment. Consequently snowplowing operations will not generally be conducted for snowfall of less than 2 inches.

3. PRIORITIES SCHEDULE FOR SNOW REMOVAL

The Eelünaapéewi Lahkéewiit Council and its Administration will make every effort to ensure that all roads within the Eelünaapéewi Lahkéewiit territory remain passable for emergency vehicles throughout the snow removal period. This is always the first priority.

The second priority is the Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit parking lots providing access to its buildings for its programming and services.

The third priority is the driveways for citizens aged 55 years and older.

The fourth priority area is the parking lots for other buildings; and its rental units.

The fifth priority area is community household laneways.

Please note: It is virtually impossible to clear parking spaces in parking lots while cars are parked there.

4. WEATHER CONDITIONS

Snow removal operations will be conducted only when weather conditions do not endanger the safety of employee(s) or equipment, and operations are effective. Factors that may delay snow and ice control operations include: severe cold, significant winds, limited visibility and rapid accumulations of snow and/or ice.

5. USE OF SAND, SALT AND OTHER CHEMICALS

The Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Public Works department will use sand, salt, and other chemicals when there are hazardous ice or slippery conditions. However, the Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Council is concerned about the effect of such chemicals on the environment and will limit its use for that reason. Even after reasonable care, snow and ice may still build up.

6. **EMERGENCY SITUATIONS**

For emergency vehicles responding to emergency situations (fire, medical, police) within the Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit territory, or Fire Department/Police Department jurisdiction, necessary employee(s) and equipment will be dispatched as soon as possible.

During an especially concentrated storm, it may be necessary to continually return to plowing the roadways and that the areas lower on the priority list may have to wait until the storm subsides.

7. DAMAGE TO PERSONAL PROPERTY

Damage to trees, shrubbery, other landscaping and mail boxes will not be considered for compensation.

Damage to personal vehicles will be considered only if they are legally parked and only if physically contacted by equipment.

8. PRIVATELY OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES

There shall be no plowing of driveways and/or parking lots of privately owned businesses.

9. WHAT YOU SHOULD NOT DO

- Do not clear your driveway until after your road has been plowed. This will reduce the amount of snow that the plow leaves as it passes your driveway.
- Do not shovel or put snow from driveways into the roadway as this creates a hazard for other drivers.
- Do not place garbage bags, trash, etc. on roadways or along the edge of the roadway.

The Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Council is committed to providing the best service possible. As mentioned, a lot of problems are uncontrollable: the duration of the storm, the amount of snow, equipment failures and fatigue all hinders the process.

The Eelŭnaapéewi Lahkéewiit Council and its Administration Anushiik for your patience and cooperation.

2019-2020 Snow and Ice Removal





Eelunaapeewi Lahkeewiit Training and Employment Department

History of Program: Through the Federal Government the London District Chiefs were able to negotiate an agreement through what is now know as Service Canada to deliver employment and training programs at the First Nations level. Recently this agreement has been renewed and is now known as the Indigenous Skills and Employment Training Program (ISETP). Many of the elements of this agreement have remained the same with the end goal to provide long term employment to their membership.

Program Goals and Objectives:

- Overall objective as an ISETP Sub Agreement holder is to help improve the employment opportunities of Delaware Nation members and enable them to fully participate in the First Nation and mainstream labour market.
- Deliver programs and services to eligible clientele in compliance with the ISETP funding agreement.
- Offer a warm and welcoming environment through an Employment and Training Centre to Delaware Nation members which would offer services to assist in their achieving goals for full time, long term employment,
- Act as a catalyst to assist client on their journey to obtain meaningful employment by providing labour market information, creating partnerships that would benefit their goals and offer several opportunities for client to gain new skills.

Services Offered:

- Employment Counseling services are offered by the Employment and Training Coordinator and through a partnership with the Chatham Goodwill Career Counseling Centre. Employment Counselor. Ms. Kim Gamage is available every Wednesday from 9:30 to 1 p.m. and is available to assist you with your resume, cover letter, job search, developing career plans, discuss your career goals and help you set a path to achieving your goals as well as discuss other opportunities.
- Job Referrals: As part of your job search you are more the welcome to come and discuss your job search goals and as opportunities come available that may be of interest to you, we would be more then willing to call you and let you know when opportunities come available.

- We have recently upgraded the Computer lab with up to date computer system which is available to you to assist in your job searches as well as obtaining information your may require.
- Faxing Services, copying services for small documents and printing services are available as well as use of phone for job search purposes only.
- Provide a bi-weekly job board in the community newsletter with job posting within the Chatham/Kent, Sarnia, Windsor, London areas. Complete Job Descriptions can be seen at the Training Centre in the Job Board Book on the resource table. Any posting that come in before next job board goes out and have a closing date which end before next newsletter are posted in the lobby at the training centre.
- Through a partnership with the Lambton Kent District Board of Education we can provide Academic Upgrading Service to people interested in obtaining their grade 12. We are fortunate to have Lori Sheppard here at the training centre every Monday and Thursday between the hours of 12:30 & 4:30 to assist our members. You can come in register, do a short assessment if you are new and begin working on your upgrading. You are more the welcome to do your work here or take it home. Lori is also available to work with you on a one on one bases in not just upgrading but also computer training, online course etc. Please feel free to come in and talk with her about all the services she has to offer.
- Twice a year we like to reach out to the community to hear from you about training, workshops etc. we would like to offer and if there is an interest, we work on putting these sessions together. When you see these questionnaires come out in the newsletter please if you are interested respond right away. If we do not hear or see interest in their courses, workshops etc. we do not proceed in offering them.
- We are presently working in partnership with other First Nations, the LHIN and possibility Visions of Harmony or Goodwill Career Centre and the St Elizabeth Health College to offer an Aboriginal specific Personal Support Worker Certificate Training Program. We are just in the planning stages now and will probably look at offering the in April 2020.

We have funding available to assist clients in achieving their long-term goals and hopefully will have available information brochures which outline the various programs available also with program criteria and what you will be required to provide to access the funding.

You are more the welcome to come to the centre to obtain labour market information, ask questions, get assistance in developing a career plan or just drop in for a smile, the cookie box is always open and the candy dish is always available, just don't eat them at the computers.


