


Their heroic acts earned many decorations for bravery as well as the







CORONAVIRUS

Covid-19 or 2019-nCov



WHAT IS IT?

COVID-19 is a new virus and so health officials are still learning about its impact and severity. At this time, it appears to cause an illness similar to the flu with the most common signs of infection being fever, cough and shortness of breath. In severe cases patients can develop pneumonia, severe respiratory distress, kidney failure and death.



PREVENTION



Stay at home when you are sick



Avoid touching eyes, nose, & mouth with unwashed hands



Avoid close contact with people who are sick



Clean & disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces



Wash your hands at least 20 seconds



Use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol



Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue



Avoid crowded places and all unnecessary travel

INCUBATION

Because the early symptoms of COVID-19 are similar to other respiratory illnesses, if you have any of the common symptoms (fever, cough and shortness of breath) you should contact your doctor's office and arrange to have a consultation.

Diabetes Canada and type 1 diabetes

300,000 Canadians live with type 1 diabetes

Most are diagnosed during childhood and adolescence. For the rest of their lives, they must follow a daily regimen of administering insulin, measuring the amount of carbohydrate in each meal and snack, testing blood sugar and working with a health-care team to stay healthy. Many feel isolated as they are usually the only one in their community or school with type 1 diabetes.

- 1 in 300 Canadian children has type 1 diabetes about one student in each Canadian school

 - advising provincial Ministries of Education and school boards on policies to keep children with type 1 diabetes safe at school
- supporting parents who advocate to schools about their child's rights
