Police Ethnic and Cultural Exchange Program (P.E.A.C.E.) West Region OPP

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Through the PEACE program, the OPP in West Region works with First Nation leadership to identify and employ Indigenous students (ages 18-20) to work at local detachments for placements (eight-week term) during July and August annually.

- The PEACE participants are assigned to work under the supervision of mentoring OPP Officers.
- As per the PEACE program officer guidelines, the assigned OPP member is responsible for ensuring the safety of the PEACE program participant.

The PEACE program is facilitated through the Provincial Liaison Team (PLT), of the Indigenous Policing Bureau, as part of their community outreach and engagement initiatives. PLT seek the support of local Band Councils through their hiring of a suitable summer student candidate.

As a participant in this initiative the student will have hands on exposure to all aspects of police operations. The student will also work on police/community related projects that will enhance their ability to work effectively as a team member. Specific work projects will be conducted in a manner that will give the student broad exposure to policing functions.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVE

The objectives of the PEACE program are two-fold:

- 1. To provide participants with a greater understanding of the nature of police work; assisting them in making informed decisions about policing as a potential career choice.
- 2. To develop partnerships with First Nations and gain improved understanding of First Nation youth and their concerns.

SCHEDULING

The detachment commander or designate, in consultation with the participant, will coordinate the PEACE student's duty schedule.

PROGRAM MANAGEMENT

The PLT PEACE Coordinator will coordinate this initiative with oversight delegated to the WR PLT Sergeant. The Ontario Provincial Police will host the work experience location, while the participating First Nation Administrative office will be responsible for allocation, timesheet processing and issuing of financial resources. Student placement remuneration will occur as a part of the local First Nation administered summer student work program.

Nominations – 2nd call

A member Nation Chiefs and Councils may nominate one candidate for the position of Grand Chief and one candidate for the position of Deputy Grand Chief. The nomination must be in the form of a duly authorized resolution of the member Nation Council. A candidate cannot run for Grand Chief and Deputy Grand Chief in the same selection. Nominations are due on Friday, May 12th, 2023 by 4:30pm and are to be sent to the AIAI Office via mail, fax or email to the attention of Geoff Stonefish, Director of Operations.

Standing Selection Policy

DEFINITIONS

Member First Nation: means the First Nation community that has been accepted into the membership of the Association and hereafter referred to as a Member Nations.

Voting Delegates: are the five (5) persons and two (2) youth delegates appointed by resolution from each respective Member First Nation.

Youth Representative: each member First Nation Community will make the determination on who they define as a youth.

Selection Coordinator: A person appointed by the AIAI Chiefs Council that will have full responsibility to run the standing selection process.

Standing Selection Process: The process for selecting a Grand Chief and a Deputy Grand Chief for the Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians.

1. DATE OF THE STANDING SELECTION PROCESS

a) The AIAI Chiefs Council will select a date for the standing selection process to occur and the Association will notify member Nations at least ninety (90) days prior to the date of the selection process.

b) A Candidate's Forum shall be held on day one of the General Assembly.

c) The Standing Selection Process will occur on day two of the AIAI General Assembly.

d) The selection of a Grand Chief and Deputy Grand Chief shall be held during the same election year and at the same General Assembly.

2. APPOINTMENT OF THE SELECTION COORDINATOR

a) The Chiefs Council will issue a call for applications to member Nation Communities for a selection coordinator.

b) The Chiefs Council shall appoint an individual to the position of Selection Coordinator 45 days before the Annual General Assembly

c) Eligible applicants must have the appropriate experience with running election/selection processes.

d) The successful applicant will not be a candidate in the upcoming selection of Grand Chief or Deputy Grand Chief.

e) The Selection Coordinator is responsible for following and enforcing the guidelines as outlined in this policy.

3. ELIGIBLE VOTERS

a) Only registered voting delegates in attendance at an AIAI General Assembly are eligible to participate in the Standing Selection Process.

b) Those delegates are identified by a colored lanyard specific to voting delegates.

c) A registered voting delegate of a member Nation may transfer his/her authority to vote prior to the Selection Process, to another person, through correspondence signed by the appointed voting delegate or the Chief or Chief's designate. This letter may either be the original hard copy or an electronic version.

d) A Member Nation shall be represented at a General Assembly by the delegates that are duly authorized by the First Nation resolution.

e) The Resolution shall be filed with the Association prior to the commencement of the General Assembly.

f) Failure to provide an authorized resolution will result in the member Nation community forfeiting their rights to participate in the Standing Selection process.

g) A list shall be established outlining the names and number of eligible voting delegates.

4. ELIGIBLE CANDIDATES

All candidates for the position of Grand Chief and Deputy Grand Chief must meet the following criteria:

a) Be a registered member of a First Nation which is a member of the Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians.

b) Be eighteen (18) years of age or older.

c) Have a duly authorized resolution nominating them from their First Nation's Council.

d) No candidate may run for office of Grand Chief and Deputy Grand Chief in the same election.

e) Candidates must have a minimum of three (3) years political experience as determined by his/her First Nation Chief and Council.

5. TERM OF OFFICE

a) The term of office shall be for a maximum of three (3) years.

b) The term of office shall commence immediately following the standing selection results.

6. NOMINATION PROCESS

a) A member Nation may nominate one candidate to run for the position of Grand Chief and one candidate to run for the position of Deputy Grand Chief by submitting a duly authorized resolution of that First Nation Council.

b) The resolution will be filed with the Selection Coordinator thirty days prior to the selection date.

c) Once the nomination is registered with the Selection Coordinator it is understood that the nominee has accepted the nomination.

d) A candidate may withdraw their name at any time prior to the selection date by providing signed correspondence to the Selection Coordinator.

e) A member Nation Chief or Chief's representative shall declare their nomination for Grand Chief and/or Deputy Grand Chief at the General Assembly. The nominating Chief or Chief's designate may speak to the General Assembly for up to five (5) minutes in support of their nominee.

7. CANDIDATE'S FORUM

a) Candidates will be given the opportunity to address the voting delegates at the General Assembly at a time appointed by the Selection Coordinator.

b) The Selection Coordinator will moderate this session and each candidate will be given a specific allotment of time to address the voting delegates of the General Assembly and answer any questions.

8. STAND BEHIND SELECTION PROCESS

a) Voting delegates and candidates will be asked to enter into the circle.

b) The Selection Coordinator will then call for the stand behind selection process to begin.

c) The candidates will be placed in the center of the circle.

d) Voting delegates are asked to stand behind the candidate that they wish to support.

e) A count is conducted by the designated counters and confirmed by the Selection Coordinator.

f) Voting Delegates may be required to provide their colored lanyard and name tag for clarification on eligibility.

g) The Selection Coordinator will then announce the candidate with the least amount of support. That candidate is asked to sit down.

h) If there are two or more candidates remaining, the stand behind selection process begins again in the same process until a successful candidate is chosen.

i) If there is only one candidate remaining all voting delegates shall go and stand behind the successful candidate.

j) The selection coordinator shall then declare them to be the successful candidate.

k) In the event of a tie the Candidates will be given the opportunity to address the delegates followed by another round of stand behind voting until a successful candidate is selected.

I) Traditional protocol/ceremony that supports the selection process can be used during any stage of the selection process as required in conjunction with the host community. Ie. Smudging, pipe ceremony, songs etc.

9. DISPUTES

a) All disputes relating to the selection process will be directed in writing to the Selection Coordinator for resolution.

b) All disputes shall be settled immediately by the Selection Coordinator.

c) All decisions made by the Selection Coordinator regarding a dispute are final.

10. VACANCY OF OFFICE

a) A vacancy of the office of the Grand Chief shall be filled by the standing selection process at the next General Assembly or Special Assembly as determined by Chiefs Council for the balance of the three (3) year term.

b) In the interim, the Deputy Grand Chief shall exercise the responsibilities of the Grand Chief until the next General Assembly or Special Assembly as determined by Chiefs Council.

c) A vacancy of the office of the Deputy Grand Chief shall be filled by the standing selection process at the next Annual General Assembly or Special Assembly for the balance of the three (3) year term.


d) In the interim, the Chiefs Council may appoint an individual from a Member Nation to fill the vacancy of the Deputy Grand Chief.

11. AMENDMENTS TO THESE SELECTION RULES AND REGULATIONS

a) Proposed amendments to these Standing Selection Rules and Regulations will be submitted in writing to the Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians at least (1) year prior to the next general selection.

Approved by the AIAI General Assembly June 6th, 2016, Wahta Mohawk Territory.

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ΑΙΑΙ

The Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians (AIAI) is a Political Territorial Organization (PTO) established in 1969, to represent their seven member First Nation communities at all levels of government. AIAI represents approximately 20,000 Status First Nation people from Batchewana First Nation, Caldwell First Nation, Eelünaapéewi Lahkéewiit (Delaware Nation), Oneida Nation of the Thames, Wahta Mohawks, Hiawatha First Nation and Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte (Tyendinaga)

PURPOSE

The AIAI Health Scholarship Award was created in 1989 to promote and recognize First Nations excellence in a Health or Traditional Healing post secondary program. 
